25 WARM SPACES FUNDED
ACROSS
GLOUCESTERSHIRE



We started to offer hot lunches on a Tuesday in November. When people visited for the lunches, they can also speak to the team about any other support they may need, and can get meals from the community freezer for the following week. We had also received funding to trial a minibus for those who couldn't get to the lunches. The trial ran every Tuesday from 1st November until end April, and this continues to be well used. Visitors get a warm main course and dessert and a meat or vegetarian option. We also cater for other dietary needs. We have decided to continue to run this service. The group has served 330 meals in the past five months (including dinner on Christmas day) providing company and sustenance to people who would otherwise be isolated and hungry.

The Keepers, Wotton Under Edge

"People were attracted because of the warmth and the soup was very popular but as people came they would keep returning and we noticed how relationships have been developing. The social aspect of the project has been really good and had a positive impact on a number of lives. Over 30 people have regularly visited and so far we have served 231 people since January 2023. There are a group of elderly ladies who come both Monday and Tuesday each week and one of them said to a volunteer yesterday that they didn't know what they would do without the Warm Space and that they would really miss it. The daughter of the same lady was in the building last Thursday and told me that coming to the warm space had been such a help to her mother, it had helped with her confidence and she was happier for it." GCF awarded a grant to Stroud CAB to support heating costs and other items for people on low incomes. As a result, 17 households were given grants of £150 to assist them with the cost of living. Nearly all needed additional help with energy costs (including oil heating).

Two families had help to replace bedding (for adults and children) which has gone mouldy due to extreme damp in their rented properties. Several clients have been waiting for PIP review or appeal and struggling to make ends meet. One person was moving out of homeless accommodation into his own property but his property was completely unfurnished and he had no white goods so the funding given helped him feel confident he could make the move to independence.

One person to receive funding was J, a single mum to 2 teenage boys:

"J is receiving treatment for cancer which makes her very vulnerable to infections and hospitalization and has resulted in her leaving her job as a teacher.

The drop in J's income has been difficult to manage, especially as she has a mortgaged property. J is now on Universal Credit and she has applied for Personal Independence Payment but her claim was rejected. J living on benefits and therefore low income whilst trying to manage her outgoings. Her health condition makes it hard to stay warm but she needs to in order to stay as well as possible. At times she has been having to access foodbank vouchers in order to manage. We were able to award £150 from the fund for the client. She planned to use this to buy a new washing line as her old one had broken and she wanted to avoid the cost of tumble drying washing and also could not afford to have clothes and bedding drying in the house as it would increase the risk of damp and mould.

J was also really concerned about her heating costs and was going to use the funding to ensure she could keep her home warm. The client was incredibly grateful for the funding and felt less stressed as a result of receiving it."

For many families effected by the Cost of Living Crisis,
Christmas made life a lot more stressful. Knowing that their
children would have new toys etc as presents meant that one area
of stress was relieved. It also demonstrated that there are other
people who are concerned for them. We supported Gloucestershire
Bundles to provide items which reflected the child's interests.
They said: "Families know that they are not simply a number, but
individuals, which is very important for their self-respect. Our Christmas
bundles mean that families who have been struggling have a better
Christmas than they would otherwise experience."

MORE THAN 200 PEOPLE SUPPORTED WITH FUEL/HEATING/ENERGY/
HOUSEHOLD ESSENTIALS GRANTS

Heart Heroes supported 19 financially disadvantaged families but purchasing supermarket vouchers with a grant from GCF as well as helping to fund transport for hospital appointments.

Ryan, who had never attended the Cavern before, became aware of the free meals programme through his housing association one of our partners. He has been struggling to pay his bills due to the cost of living crisis, and needed a place where he could attend for the day without needing to be a paying customer. Of the meals he said, "They were really helpful to have and I enjoyed the meals. They're great when you need something."

Since then, he has been in the Cavern everyday finding it a safe place to stay and receive support. He has engaged with staff where they have supported him when he has had trouble calling other services, and also talking to him about his mental health struggles. He has also been engaging with our partners at the Job Centre who host a weekly drop in service at the Cavern.

The Cavern

"We have delivered 46 hours of our social club, which we call the Fun, Food and Friendship club. This was originally set up as a warm hub and we have had over 40 unique participants attend on a regular basis. The service users have particularly enjoyed the social group and have made new friends, however another key benefit is that everyone who attends has been able to have lunch provided by the onsite café with a hot drink and refreshments. This was particularly important over the winter, however, even now with the cost of living crisis impacting these beneficiaries the offer of refreshments and lunch has been a significant help. We have one participant who lives in Bromford supported living, who is deaf and blind. She is 75+ years old and can rarely have the opportunity to meet new people. We use a pen and paper to communicate as well as some basic sign language, which all of the social group users have engaged with to try and help communicate with her. She attends with some neighbours from the supported living accommodation, which is fantastic to reduce isolation, keep warm and ensure they are having some free food."
